



Home Heating Cost-Saving Tip

Unless a health situation doesn't permit it, keep your heating thermostat comfortably low (65° F to 68° F) when you're at home during the day. Turn down your thermostat (55° F to 58° F) when you leave the house for more than a few hours and when you go to bed at night. Typically, you will save 1-3 percent on your heating costs for every degree you dial down. Check the H.E.A.T. Web site for more low-cost or no-cost ways to save on home heating.

"I've always wanted a way to say 'thank you' to the people who give to H.E.A.T.," says Margaret Selover. "This money goes to real people with real problems."

Ms. Selover had to stop working after she injured the left side of her body when she fell down a flight of stairs. She shares her modest apartment with her 20-year-old son, William, who underwent a kidney transplant eight years ago. Her daughter, who graduated from high school in 2002, recently joined the Air Force. Ms. Selover says she taught both of her children that sometimes they may have to accept help, but they should always give back whenever they can.

"No one ever thinks they'll be disabled until it happens," she says. "When it does happen, you are in shock, and you have to ask for help. Thank goodness for programs like H.E.A.T."

Did You Know...

- More than \$13.5 million in energy assistance has been donated and disbursed to nearly 69,000 families in need since H.E.A.T. began in 1983.
- H.E.A.T. served nearly 2,000 households during the winter of 2002-2003, with benefits averaging \$195.
- SCANA Energy matches customer donations made through the gas bill.
- Georgia Natural Gas, Southern Company Gas, and GasKey match customer donations made through their bill insert campaigns.
- All H.E.A.T. recipients are referred for home weatherization, if eligible.
- Only a fraction of the potentially eligible households in need of energy assistance actually receive help.
- There are 1,033,793 individuals living in poverty in Georgia.
